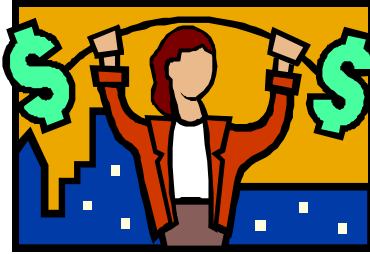

CLASS PARENT GUIDELINES FOR K AND 1

GRADES K and 1: Responsibilities/guidelines include:

HEAD CLASS PARENT:

- **GOAL IS TO GET ALL PARENTS INTERESTED OR AS MANY AS POSSIBLE INVOLVED IN CLASSROOM ACTIVITIES**
- **ENGAGE THE HELP OF YOUR ASSISTANT CLASS PARENTS OR DELEGATE TASKS TO ORGANIZIE PARTIES/ TRIPS/ ETC.**
- **Liaison between the Teacher, Class Parents and General Class Parents.**
- **Preferably have prior Class Parent experience at BMP/RSS.**
- **Responsible to provide help/support to the Teacher, in the form of Class Parent and General Class Parent involvement when appropriate to the Teachers schedule.**
- ***Responsible to staff all class trips, classroom events and parties with the opportunity to delegate out to the Class Parents***
- **Supporting the Teacher if she/he requires any copying, project prep, etc.**
- **Being available to communicate with the Teacher via email, phone and or notes sent home and responding within an acceptable amount of time.**
- **Class parents are encouraged to attend PTA meetings and partake in PTA Activities.**

CLASS PARENTS:

- **Being responsible to work together provide help/support for the Head Class Parent, and Teacher.**
- **Supporting the Head Class Parent and Teacher if she/he requires any copying, project prep, etc.**
- **Being available to communicate with the Head Class Parent via email, phone and or notes sent home and responding within an acceptable amount of time.**
- ***Making an extra effort to fill in a change of schedule and provide parental coverage for an absence with a class trip, event or party.***
- **Class parents will be expected to participate in and/or help organize school functions and fundraisers.**
- **Class parents are encouraged to attend PTA meetings and partake in PTA Activities.**

NEW Responsibilities/guidelines include:

- NEW: ENGAGE THE HELP OF YOUR ASSISTANT CLASS PARENTS OR DELEGATE TASKS TO ORGANIZIE PARTIES/ TRIPS/ ETC.
- Liaison between the Teacher, Assistant and the Parents of all the students in the class in regards to the class trips, parties and activities
- Preferably has a child that has gone through one or two grades in the BMP/RSS school district
- Responsible to work together to staff all class trips, classroom events and party's, making sure that the ALL the parents have the opportunity to take part in at least one class event being a trip, activity, or party if they want to.
- Supporting the Teacher if she/he requires any copying, project prep, etc.
- Being available to communicate with the Teacher via email, phone and or notes sent home, and responding within a respectable amount of time.
- Class parents are encouraged to attend PTA meetings and partake in PTA Activities.
- Assistant Class Parent's roll is to work TOGETHER with the Head Class Parent to help her/him staff the classroom events and back her/him up when needed.

Letter from Our Incoming HS Principal...

Letter from Our MS Principal...

July 16, 2010

Dear Parents,

Now that the lazy, hazy and hot days of summer are underway, there are moments to pause and appreciate the excellent 2009-2010 school year that we had here at Blind Brook Middle School. Our BBMS Values and Expectations: safety, respect, good decision making and care for others, continue to become part of our middle school fabric and familiar to our students.
